The staff of the Fort Vancouver Tapestry is committed to moving the project beyond the simple completion of stitching. Our best efforts will not be surrendered to a storage closet somewhere until such time - and by undefined means - that an appropriate site be chosen for installation. We are guided by and accountable to the many who sponsored panels to commemorate their loved ones and community, and the many who have given so generously of their time and energy in the creation of the Tapestry. Our debt to them, and you, requires steadfast dedication to see this project through to its true completion as defined in our by-laws - a properly framed, fully completed Tapestry on display for all to see and enjoy.

Secondly, it is imperative that a text is written and published to expand on and further define the 'moments in time' that have influenced the development and maturity of our community as illustrated in the seventy panels that are the Fort Vancouver Tapestry. As we all know, without such text the Tapestry will lose historical integrity and become a simple - but long - collection of pretty pictures.

Furthermore, traveling the Tapestry is an opportunity with great merit that will greatly aid in the long-term wellbeing and appreciation of our best efforts. It is fundamental to expanding awareness of the Tapestry and exposing it to an audience beyond our immediate locale.

These challenges are nearly as great as the Tapestry itself. The sheer breadth and size of the Tapestry is daunting, as is the search for accommodation and recognition of its scope and artistic merit. This should not deter us. Instead, we are reminded once again that "All things excellent are as difficult as they are rare". To best support our efforts the staff has identified and recommends as essential for 2005—-Increase the membership of Board of Directors.

This long-standing issue needs determined effort. The staff looks to the Board to become fully engaged in expanding the scope and vision of its members. Our current Board is composed of members whose primary interest and expertise reside in stitching. Clearly a more diverse Board is necessary to represent the Tapestry, aid in fund raising and to engage the participation of governmental and civic leaders in supporting the installation of the Tapestry in a location and setting that is appropriate.

The traditional and commonly expected role of 501 (c)(3) Board members is to focus on funding and fund raising for the institution they have chosen to represent. This does not suppose that the staff expects the members to foot the bill. It does, however, require active and consistent attention to the primary responsibility inherent in accepting the mantle of member of the Board of Directors. Our expectation is that the Board can serve an aspect of its primary role by contacting people in their sphere of influence and initiating avenues of contact for the staff. This basic responsibility of the Board has yet to be realized and needs prompt attention.

Our mission to celebrate and honor the history of our region will not be accomplished in a closet. It will be accomplished by completing the intent and goal of the Fort Vancouver Tapestry project to present to the world an illustration of the challenges faced and the decisions made that created this 'single place through time'. The Fort Vancouver Tapestry was founded to honor and celebrate the will of community spirit and the fortitude to succeed in seemingly impossible odds. If we fail to follow the very examples we illustrate accepting the mantle of perseverance and determination -- we will compromise all that we purport to honor and celebrate. Our "legacy" will not bear mentioning at all.
