There are a few books that have been away from their Tapestry Room home for quite some time.....if you see any, please send them home.




Future Home

The Northwest Fiber Arts Center, future home of the Tapestry, will be located in one of the buildings recently acquired by the city at the west end of the barracks on the Vancouver National Historic Reserve.

Presentations and Exhibit

As part of the Lewis and Clark Legacy Projects Show, the first 12 feet of the Tapestry resided at the Howard House for the months of May through July. The figures of Lewis, Clark, Sacagawea and York appear in several of the panels in this footage.

Four other 6-foot sections spent the month of July in Fat Cat Coffeehouse in Hough Neighborhood. The coffeehouse was a wonderful location for presentations and project meetings—we packed the house for a presentation to the Shepherd Stitchers, who are working on their own massive needlepoint project.
