Dear Friends of the Tapestry,

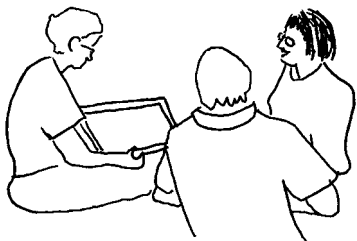
